### **MAYOR'S REPORT:**

I have two quick updates. The first is to provide a quick reminder that our second round of the Pfizer Covid-19 vaccines will be taking place at the Rolling Meadows Community Church on this Tuesday, May 18, 2021 (8am-2pm) for all of those residents who attended to receive their initial dose back on April 27, 2021.

The second point I want to make tonight is that during the last City Council meeting I shared some metrics from the Cook County Department of Public Health on how many residents in Rolling Meadows have received complete vaccine. I did some further digging on this and I realized that the Cook County Department of Public Health is providing their percentages based on the total population of a community but the total population of a community is not exactly eligible to be vaccinated given current age restrictions. As a result, I used other data to determine the total population in Rolling Meadows of those who are eligible to receive vaccine and with the updated numbers as reported from the last meeting, I just want to share that we’re now sitting at 42% of the population with the complete vaccine. Slowly we’re incrementally growing to a point where we’re supposed to be based on the CDC’s guidelines for this theoretical herd immunity and when we can safely return to all things community and all things we wish to get back to.

### **WARD REPORTS:**

**Alderman O’Brien** – I received two inquiries today, I know it’s not related to the City but I was asked to bring it up about the United States Postal Service delays and problems in mail. I had a couple residents reach out, I did provide them based on trying to help residents in the past regarding this issue is as all through the United States Postal Service. I did want to provide to those residents who have joined us online or in Chambers, there is a phone number for the Arlington Heights post office is where I was able to track down where these inquiries can be sent and that phone number for the Arlington Heights post office is 847/253-7806 regarding delayed mail and sometimes not mail delivery. We’re experiencing the same thing at our residence so I just wanted to bring that up and provide the post office number for Arlington Heights where I was directed by the Postmaster General that these should be sent.

**Alderman Vinezeano** - I actually had a resident call me today about the suggestion of having some communication with our recycling company to issue some kind of sticker that would be applied to our recycling bins. Most of us know that they're the recycling bins but if you really look at the bins they're not actually labeled recycling so her suggestion was that if they would willing to send out some kind of stickers and we send them out with the mailing of the water bills or maybe we could do something along those lines so that there's no confusion that they are recycle bins only. I just wanted to pass on that suggestion from a resident.

**Barry Krumstok, City Manager went over the following:**

**1) Community Items of Interest**

- 1) Thank you to everyone who participated in the Saturday, April 24<sup>th</sup> Prescription Drug Take Back Event here at City Hall. At the conclusion of the event, the Rolling Meadows Police Department collected 106 pounds of expired, unwanted, unused, and potentially dangerous controlled substances. [Please remember that on the second floor of City Hall we do have a grey drug disposal drop off box that is provided by Cook County. You can always dispose of prescription drugs in this box and do not have to wait for a DEA and Police Department take-back collection day. Liquids are not accepted].
- 2) Remember that the sprinkling restrictions are set to begin on May 15<sup>th</sup>. To conserve water throughout the community, lawn sprinkling is prohibited between noon and 6:00 pm daily, and on consecutive days.
- 3) Thank you to everyone who donated at the Thursday, April 29<sup>th</sup> Blood Drive. The next schedule Blood Drive with Vitalant is set for Thursday, June 24<sup>th</sup> from 1:00 pm to 7:00 pm in City Hall (Council Chambers). Due to the need for social distancing, appointments are really needed for this event and may be scheduled by contacting Vitalant at 877-258-4825. Wearing of a face covering (mask) is required. Walk-ins will only be accommodated if no scheduled appointments are present in the Council Chambers. (Future Blood Drives for 2021 are now scheduled to be conducted on August 26<sup>th</sup>, October 28<sup>th</sup>, and December 23<sup>rd</sup>).
- 4) The Rolling Meadows Garden Club will be conducting its annual Plant & Craft Sale, after a one year hiatus due to COVID-19 concerns, on Saturday, May 15<sup>th</sup> from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm (rain or shine) at 3000 Central Road. This is a new location for the event.
- 5) May 29<sup>th</sup> – City Market (1<sup>st</sup> for the season) from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm at Community Church (2720 Kirchoff Road).
- 6) May 29<sup>th</sup> – Memorial Day Parade & Ceremony starts at 11:00 am on Kirchoff Road.
- 7) June 11<sup>th</sup> – Annual Block Party to be conducted on Central Road (Barker Avenue to Jay Lane) from 4:30 pm to 8:30 pm. [*Be prepared for a road closure*].
- 8) Last reminder: The IRS has decided to delay the traditional tax filing deadline from April 15<sup>th</sup> until May 17<sup>th</sup> for this federal tax filing season. As announced on Wednesday, March 17<sup>th</sup>, IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig said, “The IRS wants to continue to do everything possible to help taxpayers navigate the unusual circumstances related to the pandemic, while also working on important tax administration responsibilities.” As stated, the decision postpones when individual taxpayers must file their federal returns and when their payment is due. In the announcement, it was also mentioned that taxpayers who owe money would not face any further penalties or interest if payment is received by May 17<sup>th</sup>. Those individuals who may

need more time than this delay, may request through the IRS and extension until October 15<sup>th</sup>. The new May 17<sup>th</sup> deadline does not apply to estimated tax payments (so they are still due by April 15<sup>th</sup>). *Please note that Governor Pritzker did announce that his administration is also extending the individual income tax filing and payment deadline from April 15<sup>th</sup> to May 17<sup>th</sup> for the State of Illinois taxes. This only applies to individual filers and also does not apply to estimated tax payments.*

- 9) Just a friendly reminder that in the State of Illinois we have Scott's Law which is also known as The "Move Over" Law. This regulation mandates that when approaching any police or other emergency vehicle stopped along the roadway, you must proceed with due caution, change lanes if possible, and reduce your speed. Please do your part to keep our first responders safe. (Scott's Law is named after Chicago Fire Lieutenant Scott Gillen, who was struck and killed on December 23, 2000 while assisting at an accident scene).
- 10) To the new Aldermen, please make sure you sign your Oath and return them to Deputy City Clerk, Judy Brose.
- 11) *Please Shop, Dine and Order in Rolling Meadows (it is more important than ever). During these times, it is significant to remember our big boxes, restaurants and small businesses.*

We had an item that was brought to us several months ago by one of the Aldermen regarding cut-through traffic on Vermont Street. The Police Chief and his department have purchased new equipment that will allow them to monitor those areas and they have started that process.

There were two issues related to signage that we since addressed, one was on Grouse and Wilke Road where there's some confusion regarding no outlet signage. We feel like we've made changes that will alleviate those concerns. Additionally, we've added solar powered flashing light stop signs at the intersection of Weber and Central, because of the wide intersection legs at that intersection there were some motorist that would actually not stop at the intersection. We feel that is a solution that will have some long lasting affects as well.

**MATTERS NOT ON THE AGENDA:**

**Alderman O'Brien** – It's our regular update from the May 3, 2021 Economic Development Committee meeting. The main focus of that meeting was to flush through some draft versions of the recommendations that are going to come to us at our Committee of the Whole meeting next week for the restaurant incentive program and what I call the small business incentive program to bring more businesses to Rolling Meadows and specifically the Kirchoff corridor. The only other addition, the owners of small businesses that are part of the EDC did comment and had some discussion around they're running into issues as they're trying to staff up for the next phase of mitigation, is that they're having a very hard time getting staff. Anybody that may be listening or know of someone looking for a job, keep an eye out for any posting availabilities in store fronts and things like that. They did have some serious concern as mitigation efforts are relaxed is that they're having a very hard time getting staff members to fill numerous slots at their small businesses.

**Alderman Vinezeano** – I excluded this during my Ward report by accident about the lighted stop sign on Central Road. I did receive feedback from several residents on Central Road, they're very grateful for the stop sign and they have noticed that cars are stopping at the stop sign. So far good reviews from residents on Central.
