FIRE CHIEF PETER SUTTER YEAR IN REVIEW

AS WE REFLECT ON THE PAST YEAR, THE DEDICATION AND COMMITMENT OF OUR FIRE DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL HAVE BEEN A SOURCE OF IMMENSE PRIDE FOR OUR COMMUNITY. This report highlights our achievements, challenges, and the initiatives we undertook to enhance our services and safety standards throughout the year. In 2024, our department responded to 4,062 calls for assistance, including structure fires, medical emergencies, vehicle accidents, and various hazardous incidents. This represents a consistent trend of response requests highlighting both the growing needs of our community, and the unwavering readiness of our firefighters to protect life and property. Our average response time remained under five minutes, exceeding our goal and ensuring timely aid to those in need.



Continuous training remains a cornerstone of our operational excellence. In 2024, our crews completed mandatory training in advanced firefighting techniques, emergency medical response, and special rescue incidents. We also bolstered our mentorship program, pairing seasoned firefighters with newer recruits to foster skill development and teamwork to plan for the continued success of the department.

Recognizing the importance of education and prevention, our department conducted numerous community outreach programs including station tours, CPR classes, and school visits to educate our diverse group of citizens. Additionally, we held our annual open house where community members explored our fire apparatus, learned about fire safety, and met our courageous Firefighter/Paramedics.

The Rolling Meadows Fire Department is fully committed to serving and safeguarding our community. We are grateful for the continued support from the Mayor, City Manager, Council members, the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, and our community members who have empowered us to carry out our essential work. Looking ahead to the upcoming year, we are focused on enhancing our services, strengthening community relationships, and ensuring the safety of every citizen.






INCIDENT RESPONSE BY INCIDENT CATEGORY








MULTI VEHICLE RESPONSE BY SHIFT









MABAS DIVISION I

THE ROLLING MEADOWS FIRE DEPARTMENT IS PART OF THE ILLINOIS MUTUAL AID BOX ALARM SYSTEM (MABAS) DIVISION I TEAM. MABAS defines response plans to any location within the State of Illinois when resources and assets to support disaster-stricken communities are in need. The Rolling Meadows Fire Department MABAS Division I Team is skilled and equipped to respond to Fire, EMS, Technical Rescue, Urban Search & Rescue, Water Rescue & Recovery, and Hazardous Materials incidents. Rolling Meadows Fire Department also responds as a MABAS Partner Agency with Cook County's Department of Homeland Emergency Management & Regional Security.

In addition to MABAS Agreements, we maintain Automatic Aid Agreements with three (3) of our surrounding departments including Arlington Heights Fire Department, Palatine Fire Department, and Inverness Fire Protection District. These Agreements are designed to maximize resources to our respective communities and increase the efficiency of the responding agencies.

MABAS IL-WR1 DEPLOYMENT ASHEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA

IN SEPTEMBER OF 2024, ROLLING MEADOWS FIRE WAS AMONG SEVENTEEN (17) LOCAL DEPARTMENTS DEPLOYING FIREFIGHTER/PARAMEDICS TO AID THOSE IN NEED IN RESPONSE TO THE DEVASTATING EFFECTS OF HURRICANE HELENE.

MABAS Illinois Water Rescue 1 (IL-WR1) responded to carry out a Search and Rescue Mission in and around Asheville, North Carolina. BC Ben Dwyer was deployed prior to Hurricane Helene making landfall. The first days of this mission were spent conducting swiftwater rescues. Once the waters receded, IL-WR1 was tasked with wide area searches followed by days of grid searches from house to house, car to car, and within twisted piles of debris. The IL-WR1 worked for eleven (11) days searching the devastated areas around Asheville.



IN SERVICE IN 2024, THE NEW BATTALION CHIEF VEHICLE IS KEY TO THE OPERATION OF RAPID AND EFFICIENT RESPONSE TO ROLLING MEADOWS AND NEIGHBORING CITIES. This Operations vehicle includes a command board and all pertinent equipment for the management of resources of personnel and apparatus during an incident.





COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION

THE COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION OVERSEES THE MAINTENANCE AND USE OF THE STATION ALERTING EQUIPMENT AND THE COMPUTER AIDED DISPATCH SYSTEM. The Communications Division works closely with the Rolling Meadows IT Department to ensure our vehicle mounted mobile data terminals, or MDTs, are operational and updated. We also work with the Public Works Motor Pool Division to aid us in installing radios and MDT hardware in our vehicles ensuring they are mission ready at all times.

The Rolling Meadows Fire Department’s dispatching needs are handled by Northwest Central Dispatch. Northwest Central provides service to twelve (12) area fire departments and is the MABAS Division I Dispatch Center. At times, when Division I requires assistance from various agencies due to a large-scale incident or multiple concurrent incidents, Northwest Central consolidates the dispatching duties into a single location. This consolidation expedites the resources necessary to respond to the emergency. The same holds true for other MABAS Divisions outside of Division I, Northwest Central becomes the single point of contact allowing quick and seamless aid for response. The MABAS system of mutual aid and dispatching is utilized throughout Illinois and five (5) neighboring states.

In 2024, the Communications Division managed the acquisition and implementation of new portable radios for Rolling Meadows Fire Operations. The department received forty-four (44) new Motorola APX NEXT radios which were funded and supplied by Northwest Central Dispatch. These new radios replaced our existing portable radios which were no longer supported by Motorola. This is the first time that Northwest Central has provided radios to their agencies. The new Motorola APX NEXT portable radios are equipped with dual band capability allowing communication with Northwest Central Dispatch, our neighboring agencies, and any other public safety or public service agency in Illinois.

With the acquisition of the new portable radios, consistent updating to our radio programming is necessary. We work with Northwest Central to keep our radio systems up to date with the most current programming.

The Fire Department purchased and put into service a new Battalion Chief vehicle in 2024. The Communications Division secured and put into service an MDT, four (4) mobile radios, and a portable radio and charger in this vehicle.

ARE ALL ILLINOIS STATE CERTIFIED PARAMEDICS.**

This structure allows our department to staff two Advanced Life Support (ALS) Transport Ambulances, one ALS Non-Transport-Engine, and one ALS Non-Transport Fire Truck on a daily basis. One ALS Non-Transport Engine, one ALS Medium-Duty Squad, and one fully equipped ALS Transport Ambulance stand ready in reserve status should they be needed. Our Reserve Ambulance is utilized for special events and is available should a front-line ambulance require repair or maintenance.

Rolling Meadows FF/PMs function under the direction of the Northwest Community Hospital EMS System and receive a minimum of thirty (30) hours of Continuing Education Units (CEUs) annually. These CEUs address Adult and Pediatric ALS and BLS Care, they require maintenance of a current American Heart Association CPR card, and completion of annual competencies in Bloodborne Pathogens Exposure Risk. This Standard is a minimum, RMFD Paramedics far exceed these requirements.

To maintain our superior level of service to the community, our EMS Committee Members attend monthly meetings at Northwest Community Hospital including:

- Provider EMS Coordinator (PEMSC)
- Provider Based Quality Improvement (PBQI)
- Computer Aided Reporting System (CARS)
- Continuing Education
- Research and Development
- Advisory Board
- Emergency Preparedness

The Rolling Meadows Fire Department EMS Division continually strives to provide the highest level of care for our residents and visitors alike.

CONTINUOUS TRAINING REMAINS A CORNERSTONE OF OUR OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE. Through education and various daily training opportunities, we continue to maximize our efforts to reduce response times and increase the expertise and efficiency of our response.

In 2024, personnel training totaled 13,500 hours. The focus was on State Recertifications that are due to expire in 2025. The State Recertification process ensures all members maintain their knowledge, skills, and abilities.

We have increased our live fire training from twice a year to three times a year in 2024. This process focused on high rise and multi-unit structures. Our priority is to remain sharp and ready to respond safely, effectively, and efficiently as a team to any emergency.

FIRE INVESTIGATIONS TEAM

IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE FIRE CHIEF BY ILLINOIS STATE STATUTE (425 ILCS 25) TO ENSURE THAT THE CAUSE AND ORIGIN OF EVERY FIRE IS INVESTIGATED. This responsibility has been designated to the Fire Investigations Team (FIT). Our Investigators' are certified by the Illinois Office of the State Fire Marshal with the completion of 120-hour fire investigation instruction. This Certification has been maintained with 100 hours of Continuing Education (CE) through classes, seminars, and investigations of fire incidents.

During an investigation, the evidence from the scene is evaluated, the fire room and its contents are reconstructed, interviews are conducted, scene sketches are created, and photographs of the scene are taken. Depending on the size and scope of the fire, assistance from the MABAS Fire Investigations Committee, the State Fire Marshal's Office, and/or the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) can be deployed. We also have the ability deploy Inverness Fire and Palatine Fire Departments; Rolling Meadows Fire also responds to Palatine and Inverness through the same process.

In 2024, the Rolling Meadows FIT investigated several fires including one which we called upon the Office of the State Fire Marshal, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms. The cause of this investigated fire was determined arson, and the person to be responsible was identified.

In 2024, Lt. Chris Lee obtained the Fire and Explosion Investigator Certification through the National Association of Fire Investigators (NAFI).

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS TEAM

THE ROLLING MEADOWS FIRE DEPARTMENT HAZARDOUS MATERIALS TEAM (HazMat) HAD AN ACTIVE YEAR IN 2024. Our HazMat Team consists of six (6) members, three (3) of which are on the Deployable Roster for MABAS Division I. Over the past year, MABAS team members participated in quarterly large-scale training drills and trained on and off-duty several times per year.

Training topics in 2024 included:

- HazMat Rapid Intervention
- Metering
- Substance Identification and Collection

In 2024, Rolling Meadows crews responded to 78 HazMat incidents including:

- Gas Leaks
- Carbon Dioxide Hazard
- Chemical Hazard
- Carbon Monoxide Hazard
- Electrical Wiring/Equipment Issues
- Overheated Motors
- Electric Power Line Down
- Arcing, Shorted Electrical Equipment
- Building Collapse

We welcomed two (2) members to the team including FF/PM Jerome Brault and FF/PM Javier Salgado. Training for our new members includes (80) eighty hours of instruction as part of the State Certification Process. Members continue to attend quarterly meetings to stay proficient in their specialty areas.



Squad 15 now holds equipment for any type of HazMat incident including a Dry Decon Unit to simplify the process and increase efficiency for all involved.

THE ROLLING MEADOWS FIRE DEPARTMENT TECHNICAL RESCUE TEAM MEMBERS ARE TRAINED IN SPECIALIZED AREAS OF RESCUE INCLUDING ROPE, CONFINED SPACE, TRENCH, AND STRUCTURAL COLLAPSE. Our six (6) members are part of a larger MABAS Division I TRT roster which is comprised of fifteen (15) MABAS Division I Rescuers. Upon completion of eight (8) technical rescue instruction classes, members achieve the Technician Level in each of the four (4) rescue disciplines. Three (3) of our members have achieved this level of expertise.

Illinois Task Force 1 Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Team or IL-TF1 is modeled after and compliant with FEMA Type 1 US&R Standards. IL-TF1 includes 240 members divided into platoons, all self-sustaining for 72-hour deployments. This Team provides heavy construction search and rescue capabilities, internal planning, logistics, structural stability assessment, medical, and hazardous materials monitoring. Two (2) of our members are included on this roster.

In 2024, the Rolling Meadows Fire Department Technical Rescue Team accomplished the following:

- FF/PM Matt Bohnen is now included on the MABAS Division I TRT training roster.
- FF/PM Tim Drain is included on the MABAS Division I TRT deployment roster.
- Lt. Rob Rabelhofer and FF/PM John Loesch Jr. moved from the MABAS Division I TRT deployment roster to the IL-TF1 USAR Team. FF/PM Loesch joined the Team as a Rescue Specialist and Lt. Rabelhofer as a Logistics Specialist. Both are eligible to deploy with the USAR Team.
- In August of 2024, FF/PM Tim Drain deployed with the MABAS Division I TRT Team to the Chicago Public Safety Academy for the Democratic National Convention on a 12-hour standby. Lt. Rob Rabelhofer also participated in DNC standby operations as a member of IL-TF1.
- FF/PM Tim Drain, FF/PM Matt Bohnen, and Lt. Rob Rabelhofer attended a Tower Rescue Technician course. This 40-hour course prepares rescuers to respond to incidents involving communication and radio towers along with other man made structures.
- Lt. Rob Rabelhofer attend 40-hour Logistics Specialist training through IL-TF1 equipping him expertise to respond to a disaster or planned event.

In 2024 the Rolling Meadows Fire Department purchased additional equipment to further provide safe and efficient methods of technical rescue:

Life safety rope – purchased due to old rope reaching end of life (10 years)

Descent control devices – safer and more efficient operation on rope

Harnesses – purchased due to old harnesses reaching end of life (10 years)

Patient packaging – allows for safe packaging and removal of victims at height

Confined space rescue equipment – increased capability

Arcair torch – ability to cut through numerous types of metal and concrete

Paratech struts – additional stabilization of buildings, trenches, vehicles, etc.

FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU/COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION

THE ROLLING MEADOWS FIRE DEPARTMENT FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU'S RESPONSIBILITY IS TO INSPECT THE OCCUPANCIES AND BUILDINGS WITHIN ITS JURISDICTION WITH THE INTENT TO PREVENT FIRES FROM STARTING, AND ULTIMATELY, PREVENT FIRE LOSS.

FIRE INSPECTIONS

Performing fire inspections can reduce the potential of a fire from occurring and keep fire safety at the forefront of business owners' and property managers' planning and programming. Decreasing loss to a business is important to us all.

OCCUPANCY INSPECTIONS

Inspections of commercial, multi-family residential, and industrial occupancies are performed to maintain the health, safety, and general welfare of all concerned. A greater percentage of the inspections in our City have been performed with the help of off-duty firefighter-inspectors.

PRE-PLANNING AND SAFETY INSPECTIONS

Performing inspections are important to the firefighters as the information obtained during an inspection is recorded within the building's pre-plan. These details, in the hands of our crews, provide for a safe and efficient response to an emergency.

RESIDENTIAL SAFETY AWARENESS

On-duty fire personnel perform the initial fire inspection on multi-family residential occupancies and observe conditions that may affect firefighting tactics. Our firefighters communicate the importance of maintaining a fire-safe environment to the public on a daily basis.

FOREIGN FIRE BOARD

THE ROLLING MEADOWS FOREIGN FIRE TAX FUND RECEIVES REVENUE VIA ILLINOIS STATE STATUTE (65 ILCS 5/11-10-1) WHICH MANDATES INSURANCE COMPANIES HEADQUARTERED OUTSIDE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS TO PAY A FEE NOT EXCEEDING 2% OF GROSS RECEIPTS RECEIVED FROM FIRE INSURANCE ON PROPERTIES IN ILLINOIS THAT HAVE ESTABLISHED FIRE DEPARTMENTS. Per the Statute, money is collected by the Illinois Municipal League for distribution. This revenue has an elected Foreign Fire Insurance Board to manage the distribution of the Funds. Fire departments that are eligible to receive this Fund, provide services for municipalities with fewer than 500,000 residents. The Rolling Meadows Foreign Fire Tax Board is authorized to expend the Funds for the following purposes:

- Personnel expenditures for safety devices or education;
- Personnel expenditures for training or training materials;
- Personnel expenditures for health or physical fitness;
- Furniture, appliances, and other materials necessary for personnel at the firehouse;
- Specialized equipment as appropriate to support daily operations and essential functions.

Major purchases in 2024 included:

- Custom firehouse kitchen tables, Station 15 and Station 16
- Exothermic portable cutting torch for Squad 15
- Dri-fit workout shirts for each department member
- Rogue Rowers for the workout rooms
- Running/Workout Shoes for each department member
- Backpacks/duffel bags for each department member

Board Members complete required ethics training through the Illinois Attorney General's Office and are responsible for each purchase made by the Fund.




HIGH FIVE FRIDAYS


